Cologne Archive Collapse

The Historical Archive of the city of Cologne, Germany, suddenly collapsed on March 3, leaving a huge pile of rubble covering one of the largest collections of German historical documents. Two individuals are missing and presumed to be dead. Hundreds of firefighters and rescue workers were on the scene looking for survivors.

The loss is far more than the loss of life and the building. The Historical Archive at Cologne was the only major archive in Germany to survive the bombing of World War 2 completely intact. It was the largest archive in Germany. Its walls were lined with more than 18 kilometers of shelves (about 13 miles) which were filled with records dating back to the early history of the city.

Cologne was first called Colonia about 2000 years ago when it

was a Roman City along the Rhine River. During the middle ages, the city became a prosperous trading center. It was a gateway between France and Germany as well as being strategically located on the Rhine River. At one time, Cologne was the largest metropolis in Germany.

Many historically significant documents were housed in the archive. A few important documents include the founding charter of the University of Cologne which was signed in 1388 and documents which established Cologne as a free imperial free city at the time of Friedrich III in 1475. Two of four manuscripts handwritten by Albertus Magnus, considered to be Germany's greatest theologian of the Middle Ages, was kept in the rare books section of the Archive. Historians feel it a great tragedy to lose the tens of thousands of receipts issued by the city from 1350 to 1450, or the 358 volumes of minutes and decisions of the Cologne City Council which cover the past 700 years. The Archive also had personal papers of almost 800 prominent German authors, politicians, and music composers. These include Nobel Prize winner Heinrich Böll, opera composer Jacques Offenbach, and first post-war chancellor Konrad Adenauer. Also, somewhere in the rubble are 500,000 photographs of Cologne and its citizens, and more than 100,000 architectural drawings and plans.

Many of the documents were so old and brittle that the archivists fear that the documents have been ground into dust by the collapsing concrete. Post-war documents, which are numerous, were never microfilmed, and there is no backup of these

records. Many of the pre-1945 documents were microfilmed and stored in a bunker in the Black Forest, but the microfilm quality is of poor quality, and may not be readable.

The building was built in 1971, and had thick concrete walls with narrow slits for the windows. From the outside, the building looked like a large bunker. Architects considered the design as a model for archives and referred to the style as the Cologne model. The thick concrete was supposed to keep the inside at a constant temperature, suitable for preservation of the documents. Unfortunately, the temperature did not remain cool as planned. During the hot summers of 2003 and 2006, the temperature inside the Archive exceeded 85 degrees. This was not acceptable for preservation of historic documents and their brittle paper and wax seals. The archive had carried on with a meager budget. The 26 employees shared a single low-cost Internet connection. Any discussion of additional money for better air conditioning and other improvements went unheeded, and nothing was done to alleviate the problems. The storage filled up over the years, and the archive was forced to rent nearby storage space for the continuing arrival of new documents, making the budget even tighter.

As firefighters searched for survivors immediately after the building collapse, volunteers began retrieving documents from the rubble. By the end of the next day after the disaster, the group had salvaged about 9000 documents. More documents probably remain in spaces beneath the rubble that could be recovered. Workmen are pumping cement into spaces in

the rubble to stabilize the area so that workers can work safely to recover more of the documents. Officials are not sure what caused the building to collapse. It has been suggested that the construction of a subway beneath the street in front of the Archive may have damaged the building. In any event, officials in Cologne have remained focused on retrieving documents that can be saved. Unlike documents destroyed in a fire or by bombing in wartime, many documents still lie intact under the rubble. We hope archivists and others will learn from this event, that our history may be safely preserved for generations yet to come.
